# CEO BRIEF FROM THE CARROT TOP

We have circled back with former students who are chefs, studying to be nurses, teaching afterschool, and still cooking in high school. Their stories, below, illustrate what early childhood intervention accomplishes. We need this now more than ever!

We are in a time of great transition as a country. Families are set to lose SNAP benefits by 2027. The Department of Education is shrinking. Grants across the region have been clawed back. Food Literacy Center has three multi-year grants from federal sources. So far, our funding is safe. Yet our demand continues to rise.

Despite the challenges, we are resolved to meet the needs of our students! We are doubling down. In the next two years, we plan to double the number of schools we serve. Our students need us now more than ever. With your continued support, we intend to rise to meet the demand.



# 20 Schools Reached! **Inspiring Food Adventurers**

In the 2024-2025 school year, we accomplished the following:

- 1,694 K-6th students in Title 1 schools received free, hands-on cooking & nutrition classes
- 191 Leataata Floyd students received 10 weeks of hands-on gardening classes
- 206 Leataata Floyd students received 10 weeks of hands-on cooking classes
- 7,008 meals were delivered through take-home Food Adventure Meal Kits
- 10,673 lbs of produce distributed to the Sacramento City Unified and Robla School Districts to combat food and nutrition insecurity.
- 35 11th and 12th grade students at Title 1 Luther Burbank High School received free, hands-on cooking and nutrition classes.
- 20 field trips reached 475 students from Robla Elementary School District, Sacramento City Unified School District, and Washington Unified School District.

Aidan started attending our programs in elementary school in 2013. Today, he's a chef himself! In 2024, he was on the team that won our Veggie of the Year competition. "What a great full circle moment!" said Aidan.

## Leia: A Decade of Healthy Choices

Leia participated in our program in 2013 in elementary school. Now, as a high school student, she's involved in her school garden. Our longtime instructor, Daikon Dave, beams with pride when he reflects on students like Leia: "It's awesome to see my former students growing up and still making healthy choices," he says.

### Maiya: From Afterschool Student to Afterschool Teacher

Maiya works as an afterschool teacher at one of the schools we serve. You can imagine our surprise when we bumped into her there after over a decade! She was a student in 2015 when famous Chef Jamie Oliver visited her classroom. Maiya got to make a salad with him!

Maiya often joined Amber for food literacy events in the community. Her mom credits our program with inspiring Maiya to be a braver eater. Today, one of her favorite things about teaching is getting to read to her students and answer their curious questions.

# OAK PARK FARMERS MARKET





Food Literacy Center took over management of the Oak Park Farmers Market in 2023 after an infusion of donations from local elected officials, who fought to bring the market to this food desert community.

## 2024 results:

- \$16K in EBT sales for farmers. Double 2023's total.
- 26,660 pounds of fresh, local produce sold by local farmers.
- \$150,000 in sales for small business vendors.
- 600 children received \$3,000 in Carrot Cash to buy fruits and veggies at the market.

Vendors say their favorite thing about our market is you—the loyal customers who return each week to support them.



# **Looking Forward**

Demand for our programs remains high. We're the most-requested afterschool program in SCUSD, with wait lists from other school districts. As the cost of food remains high and hunger rates in our region grow higher than both state and national averages, our kids are at increased risk for diet-related diseases.

We're battling the problem by expanding programs to more schools. In the next two years, our goal is to double the number of schools we serve.

We're on our way! With new grants from California Department of Food & Agriculture's Farm to School program (\$610,140 from January 2025 to March 2027) and Sacramento Children's Fund (\$1,038,382 from July 2025 to December 2028), we have secured multi-year funding to move into more schools and school districts.
